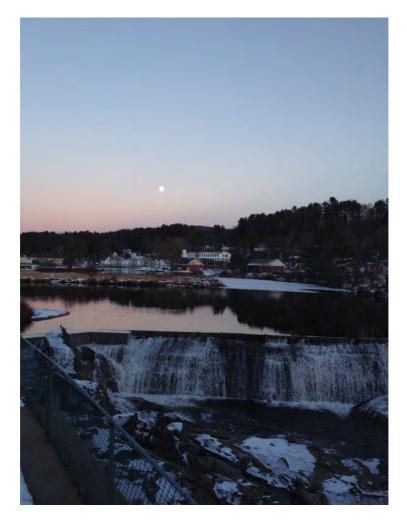

Town Meeting Warrant

Meeting was called to order by Moderator David Trahan at 7:08 PM. Mr. Trahan introduced the people at the top table; Select Chair Mike Carver, Selectman Conrad Farnham, Financial Director/Office Manager Gregory Colby and Jennifer Trelfa Town Clerk.

Pledge of Allegiance.

Mr. Trahan then reviewed his proposed rules for the meeting, the voters did not object to the rules presented.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Lisbon, in the County of Grafton, in the State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in the Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Lisbon High School in said Town of Lisbon, New Hampshire on Tuesday the Eleventh day of March, 2014 at eight o'clock in the forenoon at which time polls will open at eight o'clock and not close earlier than seven o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects. All Articles except Article 1 are to be considered at seven o'clock in the evening.

ARTICLE 1: To choose the necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, and "To bring in your votes for Executive Councilor".

Mr. Trahan noted that voting was now open for all necessary Town Officers and Executive Councilor and would remain open until 8 PM.

ARTCLE 2: To hear reports of agents, special committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote related thereto.

Mr. Trahan explained the reports are all in the Town Report and asked if there were any questions. J. Nyberg moved the article, seconded from the floor.

Article passed.

ARTICLE 3: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Million Seven Hundred and Ninety Three Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty and 00/100 Dollars (\$1,793,850.00) which represents the operating budget of the Town as prepared by the Board of selectmen, and posted with this warrant as required by RSA 31:95. Said sum does not include individual or special articles addressed. *The Board of Selectmen recommends this article.*

M. Carver moved the article, seconded by C. Farnham.

Thomas Demers presented a request to vote the article by secret ballot, correct amount of signatures were presented with the request.

Mr. Trahan explained we would go line by line and stop between each line for any questions.

Ambulance line - Skylar Boutin asked why the line was \$0.00, was explained this was from when we had a hired ambulance service. Highway Line – Roger Robar made a motion to amend the line by \$35426.00 changing the bottom line to \$1,829,276.00 Seconded by Tom Andross.

Discussion on floor if amending line item or bottom line has to be bottom line. Discussion with Advisory Budget Committee, Greg Colby and Kevin Clement on reason for cuts made.

Request for secret ballot to amendment. Yes -72, No -49. Bottom line would now be \$1,829,276.00 Article passed in the affirmative. Yes -88, No -30. ARTICLE 4: To See if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand And 00/100 Dollars (\$5,000.00) for improvements to the Town Hall Building, and to authorize the Selectmen to apply for and accept and expend any grant funds that may be available for said purpose. (This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article #3, the operating budget article.) The Board of Selectmen Recommend this Article.

C. Farnham moved the article, seconded by M. Carver.

Greg Colby explained the article.

Article passed in the affirmative.

ARTICLE_5_: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventeen Thousand Eight Hundred Eighty Eight And 00/100 Dollars (17,880.00) for the following local community services agencies:

(This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article #3, the operating budget article.) This Board of Selectmen Recommends this Article.

M. Carver moved the article, seconded by C. Farnham. Mr. Trahan pointed out a correction to the article. Birch House should have read The Bridge House. Article passed in the affirmative.

ARTICLE_6__: To See if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand And 00/100 Dollars (20,000.00) for the purpose of completing Town Wide Five-Year Valuation as required by RSA 75:8-a which states: "The assessors and/or selectmen shall reappraise all real estate with in the municipality so that the assessments are at full and true value at least as often as every fifth year..."

(This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article# 3, the operating budget article.) The Board of Selectmen recommends this Article.

M. Carver moved the article, seconded by C. Farnham.

The Selectboard asked to amend the article, adding \$7,000.00 to make a total of \$27,000.00. Greg Colby explained that the Board had been advised the re value would cost \$20,000.00 . Quotes came in ranging from \$27,000.00 to \$49,000.00. On going through the quotes, was decided if Town voted for the increase, they would take the lowest quote. Questions from the floor.

Article passed in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 7: To See if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Five Thousand and 00/100 (\$25,000.00) for paving of roads within the Town of Lisbon. (*This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article #3, the operation budget article.*) The Board of Selectmen recommends this Article

M. Carver moved the article, seconded by M. Carver.
Greg Colby explained this was the article added every year to help with
the up keep of roads. Question from floor, answered by Kevin
Clement, this amount would be used for basic repairs this year.
Article passed in the affirmative.

ARTICLE_8__ To see if the Town will vote raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Eighty Six Thousand Four Hundred Thirty Eight and 00/100 (\$186,438.00), for the operation and maintenance of the Lisbon Water Department. Funds are to be raised in the following manner: One Hundred Fifty Nine Thousand Nine Hundred Thirty Eight and 00/100 (159,938.00), from user fees and Twenty Six Thousand Five Hundred Dollars, (26,500.00) from general taxation. (*This appropriation is addition to Warrant Article #3, the operating budget.*) The Board of Selectmen recommends this article.

C. Farnham moved the article, seconded by M. Carver.

Greg Colby explained the article. Questions from floor on increase and how much is contracted to Welch Water. Hilary Welch responded to questions.

Article passed in the affirmative.

ARTICLE_9__: To See if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand And 00/100 Dollars (\$10,000.00) to be placed in the Wastewater Expendable Department Trust Fund, with said funds to come

from fund balance and no amount to come from fees or taxation. The Board of Selectmen Recommends this Article

C. Farnham moved the article, seconded by M. Carver. Greg Colby explained the article.

Article passed in the affirmative.

ARTICLE__10__: To See if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Sixty Five Thousand Five Hundred Eighty Four and 00/100 (\$265,584.00) for the operation and maintenance of the Lisbon Wastewater Department. Funds to be raised from user fees. The Board of Selectmen recommends this article. (*This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article #3, the operating budget article.*)

M. Carver moved the article, seconded by C. Farnham Greg Colby explained the raise was due to cover the cost of the roof repairs voted at last year's Town Meeting.

ARTICLE _11_ To see if the Town will vote to establish a revolving fund pursuant to RSA 31: 95-h, for the purpose of operation and maintenance of Lisbon Life Squad Transfer Squad. Fifty percent (50%) of all net revenues received for transfers will be deposited into said fund. The money in the fund shall be allowed to accumulate from year to year, and shall not be considered part of the Town's general fund unreserved fund balance. The Town Treasurer shall have custody of all moneys in the fund, and shall pay out the same only upon order of the governing body and no further approval is required by the legislative body to expend. Such funds may be expended only for the purpose for which the fund was created. (Majority vote required) The Board of Selectmen recommends this article.

C. Farnham moved the article, seconded by M. Carver. Greg Colby and George Stevens explained and answered questions. Mr. George Paige made a statement that he doesn't believe the Town should be in the private transfer business.

ARTICLE_12_ Property Lot Line Adjustment Map R-1 Lot 17, 21,24 & Map R-1 Lot 22 (Bath Road)Shall the Town of Lisbon vote to approve a lot line adjustment between property owned by the Town of Lisbon described as Lisbon Tax Map R-1, Lot 17, 21, 24 and the abutting property described as Lisbon Tax MapR-1, Lot 22, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to negotiate terms and conditions of the lot line adjustment as they deem fit? Copies of the lot line adjustment are available in the Selectmen's Office. Board of Selectmen recommends the Article.

M.Carver moved the article, seconded by C. Farnham. S. Knox from the Planning Board explained the article. Article passed, Ayes 77; Nah's 18.

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to enter into a three year lease agreement for Thirty Four Thousand Dollars (\$34,000.00) for the purpose of leasing a new police cruiser, Ford utility Interceptor, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Two Hundred Five And 00/100 (\$12,205.00). (*This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article #3 the operating budget article.*) The Board of Selectmen recommends this article.

M. Carver moved the article, seconded by C. Farnham.

Chief Tavernier spoke to the article and answered questions from the floor.

Article passed in the affirmative. Yes 67; No 23.

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Tow will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Three Hundred And 00/100 (4,300.00) for the purpose of North Country Home Health & Hospice Agency Inc, to provide home health and home care services to the underinsured and uninsured Lisbon residents. (Petitioned Warrant Article)The Board of Selectmen does not recommend this article.

T. Andross moved to pass over the article, seconded by J. Nyberg. Voted no.

Move onto the article, moved by Ina Lippard, seconded by Beth Edwards.

General discussion.

Article passed in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 15: Lisbon Main Street Inc. (LMSI) requests the amount of \$7,900.00 to support the economic development, community, and town beautification projects sponsored by LMSI. 2014 projects include the Lisbon Lilac Festival, quarterly publication of the Lisbon BixNews, Weekly Farmer's Market, Fall Flea Market, Pumpkin Festival and Scarecrow contest, Shop in Lisbon Day and tree lighting ceremony. Free Summer Concert Series, Landscaping, Decorating, and Cleanup of Lisbon's downtown and repair of the Town Message Board. (Petitioned Warrant Article) The Board of Selectmen recommends this article.

M. Carver moved the article, seconded by C. Farnham. Susan Wall, Vice President of Lisbon Main Street spoke to the article. Article passed in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 16: To transact any other business that may legally come before this Meeting.

Mr. J. Fitzgerald said we should reach out to Ms. J. Gagnon as she had put a lot of time into the Lisbon Life Squad.

Ms. C. Derosia asked if now that the operation budget had been passed with money added back in would the Town now work together with the School going forward. K. Clement answered questions.

Motion to adjourn the meeting made by P. Nightingale; seconded by T. Andross.

Dear Members of the Board:

We have audited the financial statements of the governmental activities, major general fund, the major permanent fund and aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Lisbon for the year ended December 31, 2013. Professional standards require that we provide you with information about our responsibilities under generally accepted auditing standards, as well as certain information related to the planned scope and timing of our audit. We have communicated such information in our letter to you dated January 24, 2014. Professional standards also require that we communicate to you the following information related to our audit.

Significant Audit Findings

Qualitative Aspects of Accounting Practices

Management is responsible for the selection and use of appropriate accounting policies. The significant accounting policies used by the Town of Lisbon are described in Note 1 to the financial statements. As described therein, the Town changed accounting policies related to financial reporting by adopting Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 63, Financial Reporting of Deferred Outflows of Resources, Deferred Inflows of Resources, and Net Position, as well as Statement No. 65, Items Previously Reported as Assets and Liabilities in 2013. The nature of reporting terminology differences from the prior year are described therein.

We noted no transactions entered into by the Town of Lisbon during the year for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus. All significant transactions have been recognized in the financial statements in the proper period.

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ significantly from those expected. The most sensitive estimates affecting the Town of Lisbon's financial statements were:

Management's estimate of the estimate of the allowance for uncollectable taxes is based on historical data and information known concerning assessment appeals. We evaluated the key factors and assumptions used to develop the allowance for uncollectible taxes in determining that it is reasonable in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Management's estimate of the accrued landfill postclosure care cost is based on the amount that would be paid if all equipment, facilities, and services required to monitor and maintain the landfill were acquired as of December 31, 2013. This amount is determined by the Town's engineer. We evaluated key factors and assumptions used to develop the accrued landfill postclosure care cost in determining that it is reasonable in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

The financial statement disclosures are neutral, consistent, and clear.

Difficulties Encountered in Performing the Audit

The completion of the audit is dependent upon management's review, approval, and acceptance of responsibility for the financial statements and related footnote disclosures. We provided management with a draft of the financial statements and related footnote disclosures on June 2, 2014; approval and acceptance was not obtained until September 10, 2014. It is our objective to provide timely service to the Board of Selectmen; however active involvement of management is an integral part of that process.

Corrected and Uncorrected Misstatements

Professional standards require us to accumulate all known and likely misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that are clearly trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. Adjustments proposed and approved were primarily of a routine nature which management expects the independent auditors to make as part of their year-end procedures. These adjustments in the general fund represented a net loss of \$3,988.

The government wide financial statements were prepared by the independent auditors and likewise were approved by management. This practice is consistent with previous years.

Disagreements with Management

For purposes of this letter, a disagreement with management is a financial accounting, reporting, or auditing matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction, that could be significant to the financial statements or the auditor's report. We are pleased to report that no such disagreements arose during the course of our audit.

Management Representations

We have requested certain representations from management that are included in the management representation letter which is dated September 10, 2014.

Management Consultations with Other Independent Accountants

In some cases, management may decide to consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters, similar to obtaining a "second opinion" on certain situations. If a consultation involves application of an accounting principle to the Town Lisbon's financial statements or a determination of the type of auditor's opinion that may be expressed on those statements, our professional standards require the consulting accountant to check with us to determine that the consultant has all the relevant facts. To our knowledge, there were no such consultations with other accountants.

Other Audit Findings or Issues

We generally discuss a variety of matters, including the application of accounting principles and auditing standards, with management each year prior to retention as the Town of Lisbon's auditors. However, these discussions occurred in the normal course of our professional relationship and our responses were not a condition to our retention.

GASB Statements

The Town's financial statements do not fully comply with Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 34, because of the lack of capital asset records. Thus, our opinion on the financial statements remains adverse. Accounting principles require that capital assets, including infrastructure, be capitalized and depreciated, which would increase the assets, net assets, and expenses of the governmental activities. Also, the Town is not in compliance with GASB Statements No. 43 and 45 dealing with financial reporting for Other Postemployment Benefit (OPEB) plans. We recommend that steps be taken to comply with these GASB statements.

Tax Liens

Upon review of the Town's unredeemed tax liens, it was noted that the Town has unredeemed tax liens dating back to 2010 in the amount of \$11,753, which have not been deeded but should have been. RSA 80:38 states, in part, that the Tax Collector ". . .shall execute a deed, except when considered hazardous or harmful to the Town," in which instance the Board of Selectmen should issue a deed waiver.

Authorized and Unissued Debt

The Town of Lisbon has authorized and unissued debt from a March 2011 and March 2013 annual Town Meeting, the 2011 authorized and unissued debt totals \$8,596 and the 2013 \$5,500. We recommend the Town rescind these amounts at the next annual Town Meeting.

Other Matters

With respect to the supplementary information accompanying the financial statements, we made certain inquiries of management and evaluated the form, content, and methods of preparing the information to determine that the information complies with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the method of preparing it has not changed from the prior period, and the information is appropriate and complete in relation to our audit of the financial statements. We compared and reconciled the supplementary information to the underlying accounting records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves.

This information is intended solely for the use of the Board of Selectmen and management of the Town of Lisbon, and is not intended to be, and should not be, used by anyone other than these specified parties.

The Lisbon Life Squad Members would like to thank the community for their continued support that you show for us.

During the past year of 2014 The Lisbon Life Squad has responded to approximately 265 calls for Medical emergencies, Auto accidents and Fire Stand by's.

204 calls in Lisbon, 42 calls in Lyman, 11 calls in Bath, 3 calls in Landaff, 2 calls in Woodsville, 2 calls in Littleton, and 1 call to East Ryegate VT.

We continue to try and expand our staff and have acquired 3 new members, Jeff Dodge, Scott Champagne and Conner Quinn who have all taken an EMR (Emergency Medical Responder) class. We also have 1 student enrolled in an EMT (Emergency Medical Technician) class and 1 student enrolled in an AEMT (Advanced Emergency Medical Technician) class.

We are continuing on the town wide 911 numbering system to help us identify each location. We would like to ask that until this is complete, that if you could make your house number, visible to the us from the road, That would be a great help. Those residents outside of town with mail boxes try to make sure the numbers are large enough that we can see them from the road. A small test you could try is when driving down route 302, then try and read some of the mail box numbers.

We are also continuing to move forward with the plans to build a new Fire & Life Squad building in town in the near future; and we are thankful for all the input and suggestions we have acquired of the past couple of years.

I would also like to Thank Laurie Guillmette for her 25+ years of dedicated service for the Lisbon Life Squad and wish well in her retirement.

I would also like to thank Jody Gagnon for her 12+ years of her dedicated service and desire to expand the Life Squad to where it is today. I would like to wish her well in her new adventures.

2014 Lisbon Police Department Report

The members of the Lisbon Police Department would like to thank the community for their continued support in the year 2014. This year has been a transitional year for our agency in that Chief Tavernier has retired and I have transitioned into his role as the Police Chief. He has although, decided to stay on our part time roster filling in open shifts when needed. Sgt. McKinley retired from full time status as well, however he is working on a part time basis 3-4 days per week enabling me to prepare for court as well as prosecute our agencies criminal cases. These retirements opened up a full time police officer position that we were able to fill with Officer Justin Charette-Combs. Justin has made a fast transition into our agency and is doing an outstanding job.

The Town of Lisbon has created blog sites on the Town's web page for the different town departments. You can simply go into the towns web page and click on police department where you will find some useful information in keeping the community abreast of recent issues and or changes in legislation.

In 2014 we saw an increase in crime rates. I believe this is a result of a spike in the heroin supply to the North Country. We have been collectively working with our surrounding agencies to combat this issue and are making some headway in battling this very serious issue. We have also been inundated with felony crimes this year ranging from sexual assaults to drug sales. These have resulted from being both reactive as well as proactive, however with a decrease in manpower, the increase in felony cases have placed a greater burden on each individual officer.

In an effort to expand police coverage, Sgt. McKinley and I have continued to apply for grants. These grants were offered through the New Hampshire Highway Safety Agency, New Hampshire Fish and Game and FEMA to offset the cost in extra patrols in the areas of DWI, Speed, Safe Commute, Bike Helmets and Seatbelt Enforcement and Educational programs. The Town was also awarded an additional grant submitted by the police department through FEMA to update the towns Hazard Mitigation Plan. With your continued support we plan to apply for more in the upcoming years.

Sgt. McKinley continues to offer the internship program through the Lisbon Regional School. This program is offered to high school students interested in advancing into the police field and affords them the ability to work with the officers during scheduled patrol shifts as well as a classroom educational setting in criminal justice. This has been a very successful program and has assisted several kids from Lisbon Regional with their interest in the field.

Please feel free to stop by the police department throughout the year with any questions, concerns and new ideas for consideration.

LISBON FIRE DEPT.

2014 was another busy year for us. We had 108 runs ranging from motor vehicle accidents, downed power lines, flooded basements, trees blocking roads,

Chimney fires, illegal burns/unpermitted burns, Life Squad assists, and numerous fire alarms/CO2 alarms.

We had numerous hours of in house training as well as members attending the Twin State Fire Mutual Aide School. Going forward for next year we will continue with these trainings as well as utilizing the State Fire Academy facility that has opened in Bethlehem.

Lisbon Fire also provides coverage to the Town of Lyman. In 2014 we had 10 calls. The calls ranged from illegal burns, MVA's, alarm activations, and trees on power lines.

We also belong to Twin State Fire Mutual Aide and as part of that we had 23 mutual aide calls in 2014. The mutual aide calls were for MVA's, fire alarms and building fires. The towns we assisted were

Landaff (4) Littleton (6) Woodsville (1) Bath (10)

Sugar Hill (2)

We received mutual aide 12 times from the towns of Landaff, Bath and SugarHill.

As many of the Town's people know, we have been busy going forward with plans for a new Fire Station. We have a parcel of land on Main street, but after presenting our plans to build on it, we hit a snag. The site is in the 100 year "flood zone", thus not enabling us to qualify for any outside grants. We are working with the Select board and are in hopes of purchasing another parcel, also on Main Street, but not in the "flood zone". If we are able to acquire this parcel, we hope to be able to propose a Bond and start building within the next year or so.

With a new year also comes some new changes for the Department. Chief Stevens has stepped down as he is nearing retirement and possibly moving from the area. We wish to Thank him for his years of service as both a firefighter and as Chief. We wish he and Kathy the best of luck. With that, Greg Hartwell has been voted on as the new Chief.

We currently have 18 members on our Department (2 are on active Military leave). We are always looking for new members. If interested see any member for information.

LISBON TRANSFER STATION

I want to thank the people of Lisbon, Lyman and Landaff for the support of the Transfer Station and their efforts to recycle as much as possible.

Remember the more you recycle the less waste goes to the landfill and the more money the town can realize through the sale of the recycled material.

On the financial side we recoupled 62.2% of the transfer station operating costs from the sale of recyclables and bags.

This year we stopped collecting Motor Oil. This is due to the loss of the used oil heater we had in the garage building as well as the extremely small amount of motor oil we were collecting. Fortunately there is nothing in the garage building that requires storage in a heated building so we saved the Town approximately \$5000.00 by not purchasing a replacement heater.

If you change your own oil in your vehicles Walmart, VIP and Bond Auto Parts advertise that they will take your used oil.

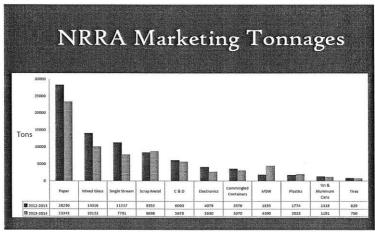

2014 Annual Report

This past year, the Pemi-Baker Solid Waste District continued its cooperative efforts to promote waste reduction, increase recycling, and to provide residents with a means of properly disposing of their household hazardous wastes (HHW).

The District held two (2) one-day collections, one in Littleton and the other in Plymouth. A total of 251 vehicles came to the collections - an increase of 31 vehicles from 2013 and our highest participation total since 2006. Total disposal costs were \$24,815. The District was awarded a grant from the State of NH for \$5,611 and received a \$5,000 donation from Casella Waste. The District's net expenditures were \$14,204 (a cost of \$.46 per resident). The table below highlights the District's HHW collection data since 2010. The District also coordinated the pickup of fluorescent light bulbs that had been collected at member towns' recycling facilities. Over 41,000 feet of straight fluorescent tubing was recycled.

In 2014, the District will hold collections in Littleton (Sunday, August 23rd) and in Plymouth (Saturday, September 26th). Individual residents can help to minimize the District's disposal costs and reduce the toxicity of the environment by remembering a few of these helpful tips; Buy only what you need. If you have leftover product, properly store it so it will last. Use biological controls and organic products for pests and diseases in the garden when feasible. Apply chemical pesticides only as a last resort and be sure to follow the directions on the label. Lastly, air-dry your leftover latex paint. When completely dried, latex paint may be disposed of in your household trash.

This past year the District supported legislation that would have placed a fee on oil and latex based paints sold in New Hampshire. The money generated by the fee would have been used to create an infrastructure that would have expanded the opportunity for residents to properly dispose/recycle their unwanted paint and to cover the cost of managing the collected paint. Simply stated, the legislation would have shifted the cost of disposal/recycling from the tax payer to the individual consumer. The proposed legislation passed the House of Representatives, but unfortunately failed in the Senate.

As always, citizens interested in participating in the development of the District's programs are welcome to attend the District's meetings. Information regarding the place and time of the meetings is available at all municipal offices and recycling centers. GRAFTON COUNTY SENIOR CITIZENS COUNCIL, INC. ANNUAL REPORT 2014

Grafton County Senior Citizens Council, Inc. is a private nonprofit organization that provides programs and services to support the health and well being of our communities' older citizens. The Council's programs enable elderly individuals to remain independent in their own homes and communities for as long as possible.

The Council operates eight senior centers in Plymouth, Littleton, Canaan, Lebanon, Bristol, Orford, Haverhill and Lincoln; and sponsors the Grafton County ServiceLink Resource Center and RSVP and the Volunteer Center. Through the centers, ServiceLink and RSVP, older adults and their families take part in a range of community-based long-term services including home delivered meals, community dining programs, transportation, outreach and counseling, chore/home repair services, recreational and educational programs, and volunteer opportunities.

During 2013-14, 110 older residents of Lisbon were served by one or more of the Council's programs offered through the Horse Meadow or Littleton Area Senior Center and RSVP. Seventy-five residents were assisted by ServiceLink:

- Older adults from Lisbon enjoyed 1,131 balanced meals in the company of friends in the Littleton center's dining room.
- They received 5,956 hot, nourishing meals delivered to their homes by caring volunteers.
- Lisbon residents were transported to health care providers or other community resources on 406 occasions by our lift-equipped buses.
- They received assistance with problems, crises or issues of long-term care through 69 visits with an outreach worker and 169 contacts with ServiceLink.
- Lisbon's citizens also volunteered to put their talents and skills to work for a better community through 1,277 hours of volunteer service.

The cost to provide Council services for Lisbon residents in 2013-14 was \$76,741.63.

Such services can be critical to elderly individuals who want to remain in their own homes and out of institutional care in spite of chronic health problems and increasing physical frailty, saving tax dollars that would otherwise be expended for nursing home care. They also contribute to a higher quality of life for older friends and neighbors. As our population grows older, supportive services such as those offered by the Council become even more critical.

Grafton County Senior Citizens Council very much appreciates Lisbon's support for our programs that enhance the independence and dignity of older citizens and enable them to meet the challenges of aging in the security and comfort of their own communities and homes.

There were many changes at North Country Council this past year. In March a new Executive Director was hired. Shortly thereafter an administrative assistant was hired in order to ensure the efficient use of public dollars by organizing the office. There have been numerous administrative changes to reduce costs including small contracts that produced an \$800 per month reduction for the photocopier lease, new strategy for health insurance which will save almost \$20,000 a year and investments in information technology that will enable staff to provide better service to the region. Four new part-time employees were hired in order to increase the organization's capacity to serve member communities and new foundation and private funding sources were obtained to provide match for federal dollars; this allows more of the member dues to be used for direct services back to communities.

Governance of North Country Council also has seen some changes. The Representatives, that your community appoints, met to discuss and approve the budget and workplan that is carried out over the year. They asked many great questions and appreciated the meeting separated from the traditional Annual Meeting. As we move forward the Representatives will play a key role in assisting with defining the methodology used for.

Beginning in February/March the staff of North Country Council will be holding remote office hours once a month in Plymouth, Colebrook, Albany and Berlin. Questions about Board roles, services of the NCC, land use issues, transportation process and other issues will be addressed by staff in more convenient locations.

ANNUAL REPORT AMMONOOSUC COMMUNITY HEALTH SERVICES, INC. Town of Lisbon - 2014

ACHS has been a vital part of the community since 1975 and **provides comprehensive primary preventive health care to anyone**, *regardless of their ability to pay*. Support from the Town of Lisbon is extremely important in our continued effort to provide affordable health care services to the 26 rural towns in our service area. Our sliding fee scale for payment of services provides a vehicle for uninsured and underinsured patients to get the health care they need in a timely manner, preventing a possible costly emergency room visit or, worse yet, hospitalization because they could not afford to go to the doctor prior to the emergent episode. Keeping just one patient out of the ER could save taxpayers \$1,000-\$1,500 (average cost of an ER visit).

Access to affordable oral health care is difficult for many in the North Country who lack the means to pay for these services. Poor oral health can lead to many other serious health issues and often leads to costly hospital ER visits where the actual causes of the problem cannot be addressed. ACHS has been working diligently over the past several years to address this problem and we are very happy to report that we have opened the ACHS Dental & Oral Health Center – the first community oral health program in northern New Hampshire on the ACHS-Littleton campus. This program is available to all and we offer a sliding fee scale for payment to those who qualify.
